Transcript of the entry

ADWICK-upon-DEARNE

Adwick-upon-Dearne is a township, village, and agricultural parish, 7 miles west from Doncaster, 7 miles north-north-east from Rotherham, 21'2 from Wath railway station, and 2 from Mexbrough railway station, in the wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill, deanery and union of Doncaster, York archdeaconry, and York archbishopric, pleasantly situated near the river Dearne and Midland and South Yorkshire railways. The church is a small ancient building, without tower, containing nave, chancel, porch, and 2 bells, which are hung on the west end. The living is a perpetual curacy, united to the vicarage of Wath, value £65 yearly, without residence or glebe, in the gift of Christ Church, Oxford; Rev. Henry Patington, M.A., is incumbent. Brickmaking is carried on. The population, in 1851, was 209, and the acreage is 1,130. The soil is rich and productive. Earl Manvers is the lord or the manor, and chief landowner. The parish register commenced in the year 1691.
