Transcript of the entry
FRICKLEY with CLAYTON

FRICKLEY-cum-CLAYTON, or CLAYTON with FRICKLEY, are two small villages forming a parish and township, nearly a mile from each other, and 8 or 9 miles west-nort-west from Doncaster (its post town), in the Lower division of the wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill, Doncaster union, Doncaster deanery, York archdeaconry, and archbishopric. The church is an irregular building, partly in the Norman style of architecture, and about the date of 1100; it has a nave, aisle, chancel, and a Norman arch. The living is a perpetual curacy, worth £69 yearly, with 47 acres of glebe land, in the gift of St Andrew Warde, Esq., of Hutton Pagnell; the Rev. Charles Edward Armstrong, M.A., of Oxford, is the incumbent. There is an endowed Chapel for Wesleyans; there is a handsome school for boys and girls, erected at the expense of William Aldham, Esq., of Frickley Hall; the average attendance of scholars is between 60 and 70. There is a Sunday school held at the above school. The population is 331, and the acreage is 1,641. There is a charity of 10s yearly value, arising from a dole on the Frickley estate.
